



- CEO/ACC Agent (Ray Drasher) Ray was in attendance at the meeting. He introduced himself to the residents and explained how he performed his duties. Ray also answered several questions from the floor.

Quail Hollow: Kevin Ferra advised the Board that they experiencing high occupancy rates as anticipated.

Committee Reports: Board members were provided with copies of committee meeting minutes prior to the session.

- Advisory (presented by Chris Blazic) Chris reviewed in detail the minutes of the May 24th meeting. Board has approved the committee's request to proceed with the purchase of the "BML" brochure (estimated cost of \$500 for 1000). Approval contingent upon a final editorial review and "price break" analysis.
- Appeals no appeals currently in process.
- Finance (presented by Kevin Walsh) Kevin advised that the committee did not meet in April.
- Recreation (presented by Brian Griffith) Brian reported on the results of the fishing derby held on Saturday, May 15th. The event was well attended and by all indications a successful event. Thank you to the recreation & volunteer committees as well as the BML administration & maintenance departments.
- Restaurant (presented by Wendy Boyer) Wendy advised that the committee did not meet in April.

- Security (presented by Mike Kloton) Mike advised the Board that the committee is proceeding with the distribution of the security survey on June 12th. The Board accepted the Security Committee's recommendation to close the owner's lane between the hours of 10pm and 6am and have all vehicles stop at the guard shack. A plan will be developed to implement the recommendation with advance notification to all residents.
- Volunteer (presented by Karen Amici).

Questions/Comments from Residents (approximately 25 individuals):

- Several residents had questions and comments regarding Deep Woods plans to subdivide the land north of the lake and the amenity rights that would be associated with those properties. Attorney Baranko (Slusser Law Firm) assisted the Board in addressing the concerns. BMLA response can be summarized as follows:
 - Attorney Baranko has been actively engaged in researching this issue since October of last year. His opinion is that no amenity rights are associated with these properties.
 - A second law firm with experience in litigating such matters has been retained to review the research and a report is expected in the next several weeks.
 - The results of the review will assist the Board in establishing an action plan.
- Several residents complained regarding the fires being built at the Quail Hollow units. This is in violation of Policy 5.1 (Open Burning) which prohibits fires directly on the ground and requires the use of fire pits with spark screens.
- Several residents commented on the large number of vehicles on our roads without current stickers or "mirror hanging" visitor passes. The Board acknowledged that a recent vehicle audit by our security firm was apparently performed in an incompetent manner and the results had to be discarded.

Gardening Corner



TIPS FROM PENN STATE MASTER GARDENERS

HELLO BEECH MOUNTAIN

GARDENERS!

May has been a treat for Beech Mountain gardeners. Flowering trees and shrubs have never been so beautiful. Along with beautiful flowers we also experienced a lot of pollen.

WHAT IS ALL THIS YELLOW DUST?

What do you call a Beech Mountaineer who is blowing the yellow dust off his driveway and deck with a leaf blower? A pollinator!

People with pollen allergies as well as the rest of us have been asking, "Why is there so much pollen this year?" I have not seen this much pollen since I lived in a pine forest in Alabama. Pollen is turning everything yellow.



The answer to the question, Why so much this year?, requires a look back to last summer. 2020 was a banner year for trees in Beech Mountain and all northeast Pennsylvania. That was noticeable in the fall when we began collecting the largest crop of tree leaves, we had ever seen. And some of those leaves were extraordinarily large.

Those leaves were busy last summer taking carbon dioxide from the air and through photosynthesis making carbohydrates. Most of those carbohydrates were not used last summer or fall. They were stored in branches and buds and roots. The tree put the carbohydrates to work this spring producing flowers and with them, pollen.

In April and early May we were treated to the best display of flowering trees I have ever seen here in Beech Mountain. At the end of May our rhododendrons gave us a spectacular display. Many of these trees and shrubs required insects to spread their pollen from one flower to another, but some of our most common trees, the oaks, rely on the wind to spread their pollen. In late may the oak trees flowered. Our oaks produce separate male and female flowers. The female flowers are inconspicuous in the spring but will produce acorns in the fall. The male flowers are born on structures called catkins. Each individual stem produces many flowers each producing pollen.

This year our trees produced an overabundance of male flower and an overabundance of pollen. This was all thanks to the great season the oak trees had last summer. We can expect another banner year for acorn production. That should make the squirrels and deer very happy.

TREES OF BEECH MOUNTAIN.

Quaking aspen (*Populus tremuloides*) is one of Beech Mountain's large tree species. The species name *tremuloides* is derived from the Latin word *tremulus*, which means "to trem-

ble." Quaking Aspens get their name from an unusual leaf stem (petiole.) Most leaves have round petioles. Quaking Aspen have flat petioles that allow the leaves to flutter in a light breeze.



Aspen trees can be clonal, which means that they can reproduce by sending up new sprouts (new trees) from their root systems.

Each new sprout is genetically identical to the original tree. A large stand of aspens, is usually a single organism connected by its roots!

There is one clonal stand of quaking aspen in Utah (named Pando) that is about 100 acres in size. It consists of roughly 47,000 trees, all of which are genetically identical. This stand is believed to be the largest living organism in the world.

Our quaking aspens contribute to the allergy season each spring. These trees are much less common than oaks and it is their seeds that cause the problem.

The tiny seeds are entangled in a cottony mass that allows them to be windborne. If you live in the neighborhood of a female aspen (male and female trees are separate) you must have noticed the fluffy cotton floating in the air, and landing just about everywhere. Hopefully some rain will reduce the allergens.





HOW TO ROCK SUMMER WITH COLORFUL SQUIRT GUN TIE-DYE

TO DO THIS ACTIVITY YOU WILL NEED:

FABRIC PAINT

PLASTIC SQUEEZE BOTTLES

SQUIRT GUNS

WHITE T-SHIRTS



DIRECTIONS

First, slide a piece of cardboard into your child's white t-shirt. I grabbed a crushed shipment box from our recycling bin and cut it to size with <u>scissors</u>.

Next, prepare the paint by pouring 3 tablespoons of fabric paint and 1 cup of water into each squeeze bottle. Shake each bottle very well!

Arrange the t-shirts outside on the lawn far away from driveways, buildings, and basically anything you *don't* want to be painted. I propped the t-shirts upon shoeboxes, but you could also use logs, an easel, or a cardboard box.

HERE COMES THE FUN PART

Next, invite children to pour the paint **into** their squirt guns. The squeeze bottles make this process super simple, easy, and *semi* mess-free!

When your child's squirt gun is out of paint, they can refill with a new color! Be sure to flip the t-shirt over occasionally to make sure both sides get painted.

Note: If squirt guns aren't your thing, a plastic spray bottle provides a similar effect.

Each t-shirt was as bright and unique as the child who made them!
