



TIPS FROM PENN STATE MASTER GARDENERS

GARDENING CORNER

HELLO BEECH MOUNTAIN GARDENERS!

They are clogging your gutters, carpeting your decks and landing in your picnic dishes. Catkins from white and red oaks are being shed



by their trees after concluding their pollen release for the season.

Warm spells followed by cool temperatures and low humidity create ideal conditions for the three-inchlong male flowers to release their goldengreen dust, a pro-

cess that each flower accomplishes in two or three days.

Breezes deposit only a small fraction of the airborne pollen onto the inconspicuous female flowers on the stems of new oak shoots. These will develop into acorns that will begin to fall in September, bounce and bank on your roof, and provide an important source of food for Beech Mountain Wildlife.

Those who suffer from pollen allergies will be pleased that the oak pollen season is almost ended. Unfortunately there are lots of other trees, shrubs and grasses waiting to shed their pollen this summer.

BOXWOOD

Boxwood, **Buxus** is a reliable evergreen here in Beech Mountain. The major advantage of boxwood is that deer tend to leave it alone. Boxwood leaves contain alkaloids that are distasteful or poisonous to deer and they do not browse boxwood. You may see an occasional fawn tasting boxwood but adults leave it alone. It is one of the few evergreen shrubs that is usually not damaged by deer.

Boxwood can be allowed to grow in its natural form, or it can be sheared to any geometrical

shape you want. That makes it useful in formal and naturalized landscapes.

Boxwood prefers soil that is slightly alkaline, and well drained. Boxwood can be grown in full sun or partial shade and is quite drought tolerant. There are two important insect pests of boxwood that I have observed here in Beech Mountain.

The first is the boxwood psyllid, a small sucking insect that appears about the time the new foliage appears in spring. Growth is stunted and the leaves curl in response to psyllid feeding. Tolerate the damage unless most of the branch tips are infected; psyllids rarely affect the long term health of boxwood. When necessary, control psyllids by spraying plants thoroughly with horticultural oil or insecticidal soap as soon as they appear in spring.

Boxwood leafminers are a more serious pest. They can be recognized by the presence of "puffy" leaves on the ends of stems. Adult leafminers lay eggs on new leaves in the spring. The larva hatch and enter the leaves where they feed on the internal tissues. They spend the winter chewing on the inside of the



leaves creating the puffy appearance. The adults emerge in the spring and lay more eggs and die.

Adults are emerging from boxwoods in Beech mountain now. This is the easiest time to control the pest. An application of carbaryl (Sevin) or malathion

applied right now will control the adults before they can lay more eggs.

Additional control measures can be obtained by googling boxwood leaf miner treatment.
